



## Creating Language-Rich Environments Tips for Early Years Practitioners

### **Why It Matters**

Children learn language through interaction. Adults who model language, respond to children, and create opportunities for conversation help them develop essential skills. Embedding language learning into daily life makes it natural and fun.

### **Simple Ways to Embed Language Learning**

#### **Everyday Routines**

Snack time, tidying up, and dressing are perfect for language learning:

- Name objects and actions (“Let’s put the cups on the table”).
- Offer choices (“Would you like milk or water?”).
- Comment on what’s happening (“You’re washing your hands. The water feels cold!”).

#### **Play-Based Opportunities**

Play is a child’s language laboratory:

- Narrate what the child is doing (“You’re building a tall tower!”).
- Introduce new words naturally (“That’s a huge dinosaur!”).
- Encourage role play for conversation practice.

#### **Follow the Child’s Lead**

Talk about what interests them. Comment rather than question:

- Instead of “What colour is that?” try “You’ve chosen the red block.”

#### **Total Communication**

- Combine speech with gestures, signs, and visuals to support understanding.

#### **Repeat and Expand**

- Child: “Car.”  
Adult: “Yes, a big red car!”

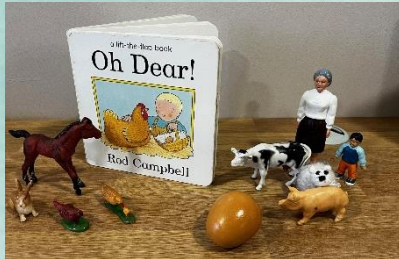




### Songs with Props

Songs and rhymes boost language. Use props to link words to objects:

- A toy spider for “Incy Wincy Spider” or animals for “Old MacDonalD.”



### Story Bags

- Create book bags with items from the story: Include characters or objects for children to explore as you read.
